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

# BACK TO SCHOOL NIGHT ADDRESS ON SEPTEMBER 13, 2021 BY ASYA SIGELMAN

As many of you know, the Jewish High Holidays are early this year, and so even as we are currently going through the first days of the school year, at home Matt and the kids and I are immersed in observance of these joyful yet also somber days.

In particular, one of the Biblical passages which we read at this time of year has been recently very much on my mind, and I cannot help but feel some important crossovers of theme between this passage and the beginning of the new school year here at MLCA:

Deuteronomy 30.19: I call heaven and earth to witness against you this day, that I have set before thee life and death, the blessing and the curse; therefore choose life, that thou mayest live, thou and thy seed;

At the Sigelman dinnertime table our kids have asked, "Why would anyone choose death? What is the Bible trying to say?"

I am sure there are many good answers to this question, but to me it seems like never in human history was the commandment to choose the path of life as relevant as to our day and age. It has a particularly deep significance for me in the context of MLCA:

In an age when great literature and poetry are all but forgotten – or, even worse, trampled and derided – our students have the chance to study, master, cherish, and love some of the best things even written in the English language.

In an age where even STEM subjects have been appropriated by feuding political agendas, our students relish the depth and objective beauty of Science and Mathematics.

In an age where historical memory is systematically erased from the public consciousness, our students have the opportunity to engage in exhilarating time-travel ranging far and wide from Antiquity to the Middle Ages, to the Renaissance, to the Founding Fathers, and beyond.

In an age where multiculturalism is an empty boast, our students explore the treasure-trove of other cultures through the proper medium of foreign languages.

Our students accomplish all this and more thanks to the choice you, their parents, have made: the choice to go against the current of popular dictum, to choose truth and beauty over the mantra of the mainstream.

This brings me to another remarkable aspect of the Deuteronomy passage which I just cited. Here is the opening of Moses' address to the people:

Deuteronomy 29:9: Ye are standing this day all of you before the Lord your God: your heads, your tribes, your elders, and your officers, even all the men of Israel, your little ones, your wives, and thy stranger that is in the midst of thy camp, from the hewer of thy wood unto the drawer of thy water;

Moses underscores that he is addressing the congregation in its entirety, as a unified whole: it is as a community that they are to make the choice between life and death.

This past year has put to test the very concept of human community – not just here in Philadelphia or here in the United States, but across the entire globe.

But miraculously, even as social relations all around us have crumbled – whether under the pressure of the epidemic, of divisive politics, or of social media – our community has persevered and flourished. It has persevered and flourished thanks to our students, our teachers, and, of course, thanks to you – our students' parents.

I say "miraculously", but in fact it is not surprising that a community which has chosen the constellation of the good, the beautiful, and the true as its loadstar has continued to soldier on, unperturbed by the endless challenges which this year has sent our way.

And so I would like to conclude my talk and open this evening by thanking all of you – our students' parents – for this choice you have made, for this responsibility you have taken on to partner with the school in taking your children on this journey – a journey that is not always easy, but always exhilarating and rewarding; a journey of the intellect across epochs and centuries.




The school has a brand-new library catalogue, which can be found online here:

## **IN-SCHOOL CULTURE**











